They are still webcast live but now accommodate as many participants from the public as health regulations allow at the time of the meeting. Mayor's message

Dear Fellow Citizens,

These few paragraphs will mark my final contribution in the Town of Mount Royal's municipal magazine. It's amazing how time flies.

After 16 years as a member of the Town Council—11 with the tremendous privilege of representing you as mayor—it is now time to leave the care and honour of working for the Town of Mount Royal community to others.

These years have proven to be both fascinating and challenging, as well as incredibly stimulating. I will complete my mandate in a few weeks with the feeling and satisfaction of a mission accomplished. There are numerous defining achievements in the 16 years of supporting our community in its many aspirations that I will cherish for years to come. My team and I have faced and managed a variety of challenges over the past decade, some of which are literally transforming the garden city.

From the outset, we declared a war on climate change. If my administration were to go down in Mount Royal's history books for just one of its many achievements, I would be happy if it were for the numerous initiatives undertaken each and every year to protect the environment.

We are also committed to maintaining healthy and sound public finances. After having received a solid financial legacy from my predecessor, Vera Danyluk, rigour and foresight quickly became our watchwords. We have managed to stay the same course despite the surprises—some of them major ones—that popped up in the last decade or so. Even better, my team was able to further strengthen the Town's finances, with the creation and growth of new reserves.

We made it our mission to make the streets of Mount Royal ever safer, readjusting our strategies almost from the start each year depending on the constraints or opportunities at the time. The same goes for setting up and rolling out an unprecedented program of municipal infrastructure upgrades. In fact, roughly \$100 million—a huge sum—has been invested in our streets, sewers and water supply over the last 10 years to maintain its efficiency.

In addition to all of the above, we reviewed and improved municipal regulations to enhance Mount Royal's built heritage and better protect our green spaces and urban forest. We proposed the first sustainable development plan in the Town's history, implemented its first Tree Policy, created new green spaces and planted more than 4,000 trees in the past decade. This was unprecedented and another major source of pride for my team and Townies who hold the garden city so close to their hearts.

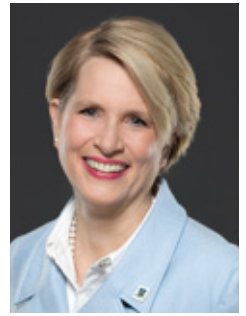

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PUBLIC SECURITY: DID YOU KNOW...

As of July, your Town Public Security agents were officially welcomed in as Town employees. The hope is that, with the elimination of a third-party service contractor, Townies will benefit from seeing the same welcoming and friendly faces serving our needs, and less turnover at the staff level.

The Town's Public Security department offers its residents a wide variety of services:

Did you know that when you go on vacation or simply go away for a few days, Public Security can monitor your home, pick up your mail and contact you to report any unusual activity that may have taken place on your premises?

Did you know that if you have an alarm system connected to a central monitoring service, you can designate Public Security as your first responder? If your home alarm system is triggered, typically your alarm company will contact the police (SPVM). Response times may vary significantly and if there are a number of false alarms, the SPVM may bill you. With Public Security as the first responder, an agent could be present within minutes and survey the premises and judge the need for police intervention.

Did you know that a Public Security agent can accompany you and inspect your home, inside and out, and suggest ways on improving its safety and security?

Did you know that Public Security agents are specially trained in child safety seat installation and can inspect your vehicle to assure the safety and security of your little ones?

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STATION SQUARE DEVELOPMENT: **DON'T MISS THE TRAIN!**

It was in the summer of 2019—two years ago already!—that Mount Royal Town Council and representatives from CDPQ Infra announced an agreement to build a huge platform above the tracks in our town centre. For the occasion, we invited journalists to the Connaught Park Country Club, where the Town proudly presented preliminary sketches of this project to be completed by the Réseau express métropolitain (REM).

The new surface area created between the two bridges would eventually allow the Town to develop a completely new public space. It would also revamp the constantly changing town centre area by cleverly hiding the railway trench and making the heart of Mount Royal even more inviting.

Barring setbacks, the Town is looking forward to discussing the development of the new space with residents on Sunday, August 29. This is a great opportunity to hear your feedback on a project that has been the subject of frank discussions and some of the most constructive collaborations in our recent history. What could be more positive than discussing the creation of a new green space in a garden city?

Just like in summer 2019, we will be inviting residents to the Connaught Park Country Club. Our teams will be on site all afternoon to discuss the project with you, and I sincerely hope that the weather will cooperate so we can unleash our creativity together outdoors. Given the proximity of the dates of this magazine's release and the event, I'm not sure at the moment

if our publication will have made its way into your hands by the time the event takes place. Nevertheless, you will have already seen the scheduled event via the Town's website or in the local newspapers.

In winter, there were already some great suggestions from you in response to the Council's call to come up a name for this new space. It's hard to beat Station Square as a winning proposition for a public space that will cover the very spot where the town's railway-rich history began.

I look forward to the same inspiration when discussing the development of the new space which, after our work this fall, will be ready to welcome you in 2022.

MOHAWK PARK CHALET: PREP WORK TAKING SHAPE

Developments have continued at Mohawk Park since the 2019 public consultation. Following the addition of a dog run and the replacement of the water playground, attention now turns to the chalet.

The Town is preparing for a major renovation of the building, including an extension at the rear. A lot of the planned work is to improve facilities for people with disabilities. The Town's focus is on removing various barriers to mobility which involves reconfiguring and relocating the exterior ramp and improving access to the front deck. The plans also include electric door openers, elevators, adapted toilets, visible and audible alarm systems as well as large print and Braille signage.

Construction is expected to begin in 2022.



SUMMERFEST: **FUN IN THE FALL?**

Many details remain unknown at the time of going to press, but September 11 might be the date when this year's Summerfest will finally be held, possibly to be hybridized with the Multicultural Fair. As usual, the sanitary restrictions in effect around that time will weigh heavily into the matter.

MUNICIPAL ELECTION: KEY DATES

Do you want to run for office?

Nomination papers will be accepted from **September 17 to October 1, at 16:30.**

For more information or to obtain a nomination form, please contact the returning officer at 514 734-2985.

Do you want to vote?

October 18 to 20: revision of the list of electors

You can vote only if your name is entered on the list of electors. A notice of revision will be sent to you in early October; please read it carefully. If your name does not appear on it, if it contains errors or if you do not receive it, you are probably not on the list of electors. In such cases, to be qualified to vote, you must apply in person to the Board of Revisors at Town Hall and bring with you two pieces of identification, one of which must include a proof of address.

- **Monday and Tuesday, October 18 and 19**, from 14:30 to 17:30 and from 19:00 to 22:00
- **Wednesday, October 20**, from 10:00 to 13:00 and from 14:30 to 17:30

October 30 and 31: advance poll

Between 9:30 and 20:00, over two days, all voters who are entered on the list of electors can vote in the advance poll. Keep the reminder card that was mailed to you and bring it with you; beside telling you where to vote, it will allow you to be identified faster at the polling station.

Sunday, November 7: polling day

On polling day, you can vote between 9:30 and 20:00 at the polling station specified on the reminder card that was mailed to you. The election results will be announced in the evening, as the votes are tallied. The results will be relayed online, starting possibly as early as 21:00, using an electronic solution yet to be determined but which will be advertised in a timely manner at www.town.mount-royal.qc.ca.

Voting by mail

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the electors below will be able to exercise their right to vote by mail, upon request:

- those who will be 70 years of age or older on polling day;
- residents of a CHSLD or a private seniors' residence listed in the register established under the *Act Respecting Health Services and Social Services*;
- persons unable to move because of health reasons, along with a caregiver domiciled at the same address;
- persons whose isolation is recommended or who were ordered to isolate by public health authorities due to the COVID-19 pandemic;
- persons registered on the list of electors as non-domiciled electors.

5 TIPS FOR PRESERVING YOUR HARVEST

By August your garden should be bursting with a variety of fruits and vegetables. Halfway through harvest season, you can still enjoy strawberries, fresh herbs and asparagus, while fall favourites such as apples, beets, cherries, pears and squash should be taking shape.

If you had a successful season this year, your garden may be overflowing with vegetables, herbs and fruits to preserve—but where to start?

Herbs: Herbs are well-known for often producing a lot more than we need in the summer months. To avoid getting caught out just before the winter freeze arrives, plan how to store them now. Some herbs are ideal for drying, but not all respond well to this method. Planning ahead will give you the time to enjoy creating delicious preserves using a range of recipes and methods, such as flavored butters, infused oils, marinades, pestos, sauces, ice cubes, dried bouquets and curing salts.

Squash: Squash can be stored for months on the countertop, making it a very practical vegetable to grow. Pumpkin and butternut squash purées, cooked and frozen, can be used in pies, soups, muffins and other dishes.

Tomatoes: This fruit is so versatile that we often grow it in large quantities and then quickly find ourselves overloaded and looking for solutions. Storing tomatoes without any seasoning, frozen, in jars or dried can save a lot of money and avoid waste.



At the end of the season, you'll sometimes end up with large amounts of green tomatoes. Besides the classic green ketchup, why not try making Mexican salsa or fried green tomatoes, or dream up a delicious savoury tart with herbes de Provence.

Sweet fruits: Jams, jellies and sauces may be off the menu for those wanting to avoid sugar, but dehydrating is proving increasingly popular. Have you ever added dried strawberries to your cereal or yogurt? The taste is amazing and you'll save a lot of money by doing it yourself.

Root vegetables: If you have the space at home, find somewhere that could serve as a walk-in cold room. Our grandparents made the most of this method and kept supplies of potatoes, beets, carrots, parsnips and garlic all year long.

Enjoy the taste of summer year-round while reducing food waste, saving money and giving your dishes a variety of flavours during the long winter months!

GARDENING YEAR-ROUND

Have you enjoyed gardening in town this summer but don't want to wait until spring to start over? Do like the experts and extend the season!

1. Plant bulbs for spring. Garlic, tulips, crocus, hyacinths—fall is the ideal time to plan your spring blooms. Nothing says goodbye winter like vibrant crocus poking through the snow.
2. Did you grow potted perennials this summer? Fabric gardening pots offer better hydration and help perennials survive the winter. Even on a balcony, raspberries, herbs such as oregano, mint and chives, flowers and more will be back growing next spring!
3. Before the end of the season, visit a public market and buy a range of the finest vegetables to use their seeds or even get them growing again. There are plenty of informative videos online to help you master the art of regrowing vegetables. When it comes to seeds, dry, label and store them in a dry place. Next spring, your garden will be home to the best vegetables in the neighbourhood!
4. If you miss nature's greenery over winter, you can always grow sprouts inside. They're easy to grow and delicious. It's also a great activity to do with the kids.

DOCUMENT SHREDDING: TWO TRUCKS THIS FALL

Each year, during its free compost distribution, held in the spring and fall at the municipal workshops (180 Clyde Road), the Town adds to this activity a document shredding service, provided by the presence of a specialized truck. For one day, always the Saturday, residents have the opportunity to have their confidential documents shredded for free.

This year, at the spring event, the service was a huge success and the shredding truck was already full even before the morning ended.

This fall, the Town plans on bringing in two trucks for this purpose. The next free compost distribution will take place on October 9 and 10. The two trucks will be present on Saturday, October 9, starting at 9:00. First come, first served.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 2: PUBLIC ALERT SIREN TEST

This year, the usual public alert siren tests conducted in various factories across the Island of Montreal will take place on Saturday, October 2, between 10:00 and 14:30 depending on the location.

Near TMR, it is the siren at the Saputo plant (2365 Côte-de-Liesse Road) in Saint-Laurent that will blare out for the occasion.

This is only a test and on October 2, no specific measures should be taken, were you to hear it.

TOP-QUALITY WATER



Worried about the lead content in your drinking water? Intrigued by the general quality of what comes out of your tap?

Rest easy: weekly tests of the local system already allow for the ongoing monitoring of various drinking water parameters, including its chlorine content. Furthermore, an additional in-depth lead and copper analysis is conducted each year, confirming Mount Royal's water quality and its lead levels beyond any doubt, with no problems ever detected.

However low the maximum acceptable concentration of lead in drinking water authorized by the provincial government evolves over time, Mount Royal water continues to qualify for this ever tighter standard, with concentrations so low that they are deemed to be insignificant.

While the Town's public water supply system contains no lead pipes, this may not have been the case for private residential pipes connected to the system, especially those installed prior to 1970. In 2006, Mount Royal undertook an extensive verification of lead service lines in private residences. At the time, the Town didn't detect any noticeable issue.

Elsewhere on the Island of Montréal, lead plumbing can be found in 1940s and 50s "post-war" houses, among others, but this type of construction does not exist in Mount Royal.

Residents who would like to have their tap water service lines checked should contact a plumber. And those wanting to analyze the quality of their water should do so through a private laboratory.

ROYALMOUNT PROJECT:

the reflection continues

The Town Council is currently considering developer Carbonleo's proposal to add a residential component to the Royalmount project. In 2015, this project to redevelop an underutilized section of the industrial sector centred around retail, entertainment and hospitality facilities as well as office space. This initial version was approved; a permit was issued and work began in 2019.

Today, the potential addition of 3,250 residential units promises significant financial benefits for the Town. On the other hand, the proposal requires the Town Council to consider other aspects, such as the zoning and land development implications.

New residential areas all around

For several years now, the Namur-De la Savane sector seems to have been undergoing major changes on both sides of the Décarie Expressway. Many multi-unit residential projects are either under development or being completed on Montréal land. Just take the old racetrack site as an example, or the Le Triangle sector overall, or the Cité Midtown project in Saint-Laurent.

SUMMARY OF FINANCIAL IMPACTS AND BENEFITS

According to developer Carbonleo, the Royalmount project represents an investment of some \$6.8 billion. Conducted in six phases, the project would be completed in 2033. The new neighbourhood would immediately be equipped with public infrastructure (library, arena, green spaces, etc.) built at the developer's expense and operated by the Town.

Over the course of the project, the value of building permits for the commercial component will total \$27 million (current 2019 dollars). Over \$3.5 million has already been paid to the Town. By 2033, the commercial project's taxable property value will total \$3.1 billion (2019 dollars). Building permits for the residential component would generate more than an additional \$12 million (current 2019 dollars). Over time, the taxable land value of the residential project would total \$2.8 billion (current 2019 dollars). If the residential component gets the green light, the first units are scheduled for completion in 2024.

THE TOWN COUNCIL CONSULTS

No decision has been taken on the possible amendment of By-law No. 1441 on Town zoning to allow for the inclusion of a residential component in the Royalmount project.

On the evening of June 22, Mount Royal residents were invited to a virtual consultation on this matter. Their comments were subsequently received in writing until July 19. The Town Council must consider all opinions and submissions received, as well as the results of a Leger survey, to guide its decision concerning the Royalmount project.

AÉROPORTS DE MONTRÉAL (ADM) : ALL INFO ONLINE

The Town occasionally passes on public service announcements from the news section of Aéroports de Montréal when they are of interest to the Mount Royal community, especially regarding runway work at YUL Montréal-Trudeau that will change the trajectories or frequency of flights over our garden city.

Filing a complaint online is easy

The best-informed Townies don't wait for this information to be passed on and instead visit the Aéroports de Montréal's online solutions (www.admtl.com) directly, which offers a free newsletter subscription and a range of useful tools for residents wishing to file a noise complaint.

Apart from electronic complaint forms (accessible on any modern device), it also encourages using the free WebTrak app, which provides live coverage of flight paths, aircraft types and altitudes of aircraft flying over your home. The tool also lets you file a complaint, if necessary: webtrak.emsbk.com/yul2.

Also by phone

Not comfortable with today's technology? You can still file a complaint by calling 514-633-3351 and giving your name, full contact details, and the date and time of the incident you wish to report. Aéroports de Montréal will follow up and log any complaint it receives.

ANYTIME BICYCLE ENGRAVING BY PUBLIC SECURITY

In order to prevent bicycle theft and facilitate searches in the event of theft, Public Security started offering this summer a free bicycle marking service (engraving), available at all times.

Once a bicycle has been marked, its number will be entered in a register shared with the Service de police de la ville de Montréal (SPVM). For deterrence purposes, a sticker will also be affixed to the bicycle to let people clearly know that it is registered.
