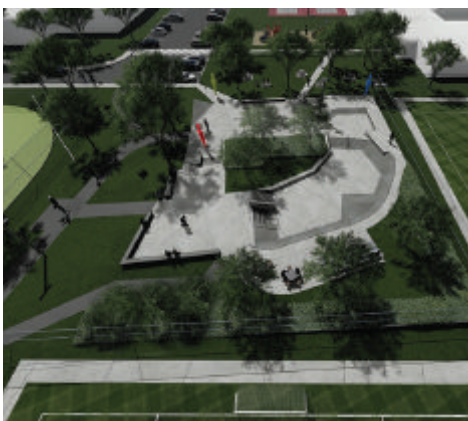

Message from the Mayor

AN UPDATE ON TWO IMPORTANT PROJECTS FOR OUR COMMUNITY

THE FUTURE QUARTIER SPORTIF ET COMMUNAUTAIRE

Since the municipal election last fall, it is not uncommon for a citizen to ask me about the new recreation center project. Some are under the impression that the Town is going around in circles and “not moving forward”. This is far from the case. Today, I would like to take the opportunity to share with you what we have observed over the past few months, as newly elected officials, and more importantly, the actions we have taken to move this project forward.

OBSERVATION NO. 1: ELECTED OFFICIALS AGREE ON THE NEEDS AND ON THE GOOD WORK ALREADY DONE

First, all elected officials agree on the needs to be met for recreational, sports and community services. We also recognize that a lot of good work has already been done over the past few years to assess present and future needs.

OBSERVATION #2: NEW FACTS AND ELEMENTS HAVE COME TO LIGHT

Secondly, we have learned along the way that some of the municipal buildings, installations and equipment located around and in Danyluk Park are obsolete and need to be rebuilt, sooner or later.

As Council Members, one of our jobs is to look at the big picture and to intelligently plan what needs to be built, demolished and replaced, allowing the Town to save money in the long run and most importantly, to avoid disruption of services to residents. Furthermore, since we are dealing with major infrastructures, we must not only look at the cost of these infrastructures, but also evaluate what will best serve the majority of our community members for the next 70 years.

With this in mind, we are working together to build a more complete vision that will reflect the spirit and culture of our Garden City and unite our community around service offerings that meet the needs of residents of all ages.

We are looking at what the best options are and there are several that have been proposed and are under consideration. Council has mandated our administrative services under the direction of Town Manager Ava Couch to objectively evaluate the impacts, advantages, disadvantages and costs of this project.

For my part, I am committed to sharing with you the fruits of Council's reflections this coming fall. In the meantime, I invite you to continue to share your ideas and concerns regarding these facilities, which must reflect our community and its needs. THE FUTURE FRANCOPHONE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

In the long-awaited future French-language school project, Orientation meetings regarding the long-awaited French-language school project were held between the Centre de Services Scolaires Marguerite-Bourgeois (CSSMB) Board of Directors and professionals and representatives of the Town's administration. An ad hoc committee composed of elected officials, members of the Town's administration, and residents involved in the TMR school system accepted the task of identifying and analyzing potential sites. These included existing schools and other buildings as well as certain green spaces.

After a review based on various criteria grouped under “accessibility and mobility” and “community impact”, the committee selected five potential sites that were submitted to the CSSMB. Although all council members were provided a copy of the committee's report and were briefed on the shortlist recommendations, they as of this writing, still feel it important to further discuss the matter.

The site chosen will need to meet criteria of the MEQ in terms of legal jurisdiction; traffic and environmental impact studies will also be required. All this prior to a final decision and official announcement being made.

I would like to reassure residents that they will be fully informed about the issues surrounding the site selection and that we will be hosting a public information evening allowing stakeholders to express themselves. Nonetheless we have to be conscious of the fact that there is no perfect solution; and that the decision must consider the best interests of the children in need of education. We do not wish to find ourselves in a situation whereby our young elementary school children are bussed out of TMR to access educational institutions.

We continue to work on finding a satisfactory solution that will meet the conditions and criteria necessary for the construction of a new generation school, keeping in mind the basic premise: good for the children, good for the community, good for the Town.

In closing, I would like to wish you all a wonderful end of summer with family, neighbors and friends.

OUR HERITAGE MATTERS

Dear fellow citizens,

Recognized for the quality of its environment and services and attractive to new families, who dream of moving here, Town of Mount Royal is a most appealing community. With several infrastructure projects under way and home renovations booming, our Town has reached a turning point in the relationship between heritage and urbanization. That is why the subject of this first column is municipal urban planning.

This fall, with the aim of improving the planning of our Town's harmonious development, we will be contacting you to discuss urban planning and architecture. We will explain the merits of various aspects of the by-laws that underpin the Town's development: the issuing of construction permits, the Site Planning and Architectural Integration Program (PIIA), the Planning Advisory Committee (CCU), the Demolition Committee and several other aspects of the by-laws and standards that guide the Town's growth and development.

Here is a preview of what we are talking about.

As you know and are grateful for every day, we are fortunate to live a garden city, a verdant gem in the centre of the Island of Montreal. Our Town was entirely and magnificently laid out according to the plans of renowned landscape architect Frederick Gage Todd as the tunnel under the mountain was being dug at the start of the 20th century.

To preserve our quality of life, successive Town Councils have – since 1912, when the body was created – adopted various regulatory practices and planning tools that have helped maintain and increase the property value of our homes while also favouring development in our residential neighbourhoods that is harmonious and respectful of our distinctive architectural heritage.

In 2003, the Town adopted the Site Planning and Architectural Integration Plan (PIIA) for its entire territory. As defined in Town By-law No. 1449, the Site Planning and Architectural Integration Plan is a qualitative assessment tool applicable to projects. It aims to provide a framework

for all construction, exterior transformation, subdivision, signage and landscaping work. It give the Town a degree of control over the placement and architecture of buildings under construction, most notably regarding bulk and appearance, to ensure the quality of the project, based on the characteristics of the area where the work is being done.

The aim of the PIIA is to preserve and develop quality architecture and landscaping in the Town. The PIIA protects and expands our built heritage.

The technical analysis of each project's compliance is performed by professionals and technicians from our Urban Planning Department and is submitted to members of the Urban Planning Committee (CCU). They, in turn, recommend submitted applications for approval by Council. It is your responsibility to verify the bylaws and obtain information in order to submit a conforming project. We encourage you to come and meet the staff of the Urban Planning and Development Department. They will be able to answer all your questions and guide you in your renovation projects.

A communication campaign to be launched this fall will help you better understand all the aspects of our municipal urban planning and answer your many questions about the subject. It will also be an opportunity to learn about all the tools at the Town's disposal for helping you with your renovation project and ensuring that quality architecture and harmonious urban development are maintained for the good of the entire community. We look forward to discussing the issue with you!

Tips: In the Residential Renovations section of the Town's website, you will find all relevant information about permit applications the CCU, the PIIA, as well as various by-laws related to construction and urban planning.



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MOUNT ROYAL: SMART TOWN, CONNECTED INDIVIDUALS

One of the many projects the Town currently has underway, a shift in our communications has begun. The aim is to be more connected to Townies. Facilitating access to information and urban planning and Public Works requests and applications is one of the ambitions driving us in recent months and a goal we have set for next year

The Town's Communications team and the Communication Committee, made up of municipal elected officials, are working together to refine the existing communication tools and introduce new ones.

Our ultimate objective is to better meet your needs, so it is natural for us to seek your opinion of and level of satisfaction with the tools in place and to want to learn more about your information consumption habits and expectations of the Town around communication.

A survey will be conducted in the coming weeks. We encourage you to take the few minutes required to answer it. To the extent it can, the Town's communication offer will be adapted to the responses gathered. The survey will act as a compass to guide our next steps.

In short, this is a perfect opportunity to express yourself and provide us with guidance about your needs. You will be able to take the survey on our website, and an invitation will be launched via our Newsletter and Facebook page. The ball is in your court and we look forward to hearing from you!

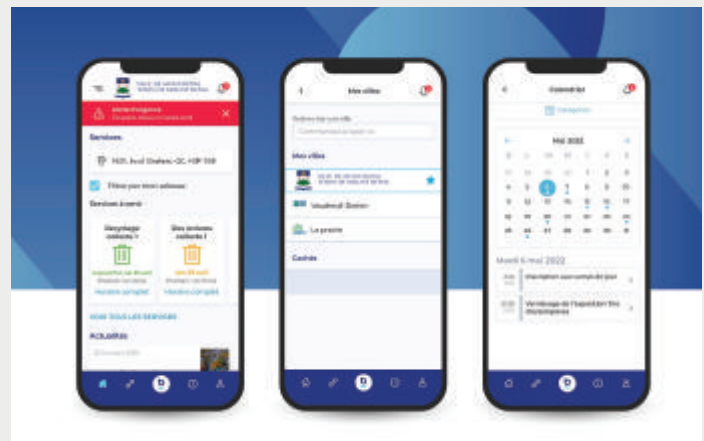

MAXIMIZING SAFETY AROUND DAKIN PARK FOR ALL

To improve road safety in the area, street reconfiguration work around Dakin Park is planned. The changes will benefit drivers, cyclists and pedestrians alike and help to make this part of Town feel safer.

FOOD TRUCKS

The food trucks that have proved so popular in Mount Royal in recent summers are back this year, congregating alongside Connaught Park every Thursday until September 1. The weekly happening is a great opportunity to gather with family members and friends and taste a range of treats that will delight food lovers of every stripe.

The Town is maintaining its requirement that the trucks commit to being eco-responsible. All supplies, including plates and utensils, must be compostable. The general requirement not to compete with the permanent dining establishments in Town centre also remains in effect, with any duplication of their menus basically prohibited.

TIP : Before heading out, visit Cuisinederue.org to make sure the event is happening and see which trucks will be showing up.



PUBLIC MARKET

After a two-year absence, the public market is back in Mount Royal. Local producers and transformers invite you to Moyle Road near Connaught Park every Thursday from 15:00 to 19:00 through September 1.

This quality market offers a large selection of products from area farms. It is an excellent way to stock up on fresh food while also spending a few relaxed moments in the heart of our garden city.

Each week during the season, we will have the privilege of welcoming the most environment-friendly artisans of the earth, the most passionate farmers and the most meticulous transformers. Come for great produce and fun encounters!

WATER METER MAINTENANCE

Town of Mount Royal has hired a firm, Compteurs d'eau du Québec, to replace the register on home water meters. The register is the part that records and transmits the water consumption data. The replacement is part of a regular maintenance procedure and normally involves no fees.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS: LET'S TALK NUMBERS... A LOOK

The results of the 2021 fiscal year paint a rosy picture of the Town's financial position, showing a surplus of \$13,373,909.

The surplus is mainly due to higher revenue combined with savings on operating expenses as budgeted for 2021. In his report on the highlights, Mayor Peter J. Malouf made a point of acknowledging the prudence and foresight of the preceding administration, which place the Town in a good position for the future.

The surplus gives the Town's new Council more flexibility and manoeuvring room to use a portion of these funds to help reduce the future tax bills of residents or to invest in projects important to Townies, including the construction of modern sports and community facilities that meet the needs of the majority of residents. The figures presented in the report confirm that interesting opportunities are in store for our community.



FAMILY BIKE RIDE: CYCLING AND HAVING FUN IN THE HEART OF TOWN

Mount Royal's Recreation, Culture and Community Activities Department held its Family Bike Ride on Sunday, May 29. In preparation for the event, the Town prepared a pleasant eight-kilometre route for cycling with family members and friends. More than 600 people took part in the event, an annual feature in our garden city. After completing their ride, participants could enjoy activities and entertainment provided by the Town.



COMMUNITY GARAGE SALE AS POPULAR AS EVER

IN OUR STREETS, WE LOOK AFTER THOSE WE CARE ABOUT

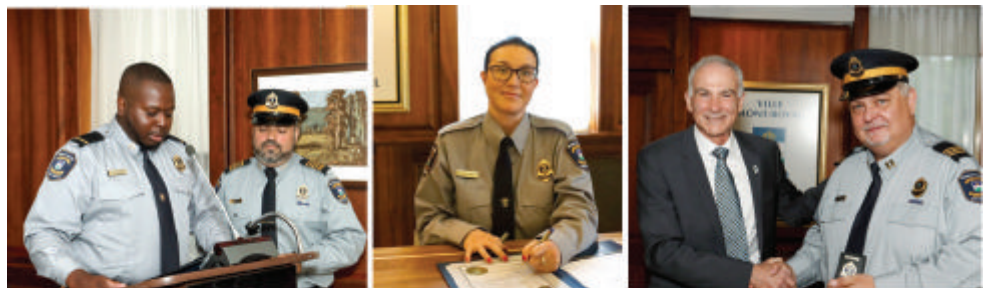
When the warm weather returns, the streets of our garden city come to life. And all those pedestrians, cyclists and drivers find themselves sharing the same road space.

It was in May that **25 Public Security agents were sworn in** at Town Hall. The ceremony took place in the presence of Mayor Peter J. Malouf, Town Manager Ava Couch and senior officers.



All these agents are now part of the Town's regular personnel and are involved in various on-the-ground watch and prevention efforts.

In a garden city like ours, residents are naturally interested in urban agriculture. Since 2021, the Town has had a policy in place to better guide the practice.

SEASONAL TIPS FOR YOUR GARDEN

Our environment professionals would like to share a few gardening tips to make your life easier this summer and to reduce your environmental impact.

- 1** Include more edible plants in your garden. Not only will you be more food self-sufficient, there are ways to preserve your harvest and enjoy the bounty all year long.
- 2** Plant lavender around outdoor dining areas to keep undesirables away. At summer's end, cut the stems and bring them indoors to scent your home.
- 3** Plant large, broad-crowned trees to reduce heat islands. Napping in the shade is one of life's great pleasures!
- 4** Add clover to your lawn. It naturally enriches the soil with nitrogen and repulses white grubs, which don't like its flavour. What's more, it thrives in sunny yards and attracts pollinators, as every good ecological lawn should.
- 5** Grasscycle! Leave the grass trimmings on the lawn. You'll cut mowing time, reduce the need for watering and help keeps weeds away.



FREE URBAN GARDENING WORKSHOPS



In May and June, the Town – in collaboration with horticulturist, biologist and Mount Royal resident Albert Mondor – held free gardening workshops that were attended by around 50 residents. The goal was to set Town households on the right path to creating and tending to a kitchen garden all season long.

Did you know that regardless of the year in which your home was built, all plumbing connections, including the basement floor drain, should be equipped with check valves?
(Articles 68 to 70 of Construction By-Law No. 1443)

In the event of heavy precipitations, especially when there is a lot of surface water, your valves may shut off in order to play their protective role.

Be careful! When you flush the toilet and your valves have already shut off to control backflow, they will also block all other water flow. You run the risk of flooding yourself!

AÉROPORTS DE MONTRÉAL (ADM) : AIRCRAFT OVER OUR GARDEN CITY

In the News section of its website, the Town occasionally posts public service announcements issued by Aéroports de Montréal that are likely to be of interest to the Mount Royal community. That is especially the case when work on a runway at Montréal-Trudeau changes the paths and frequencies of flights over our garden city.

Submitting a complaint online or by phone

As noise nuisances are an area of jurisdiction of the federal government and not of the municipalities located near airports, it falls to Transport Canada to enforce compliance with the rules to manage the noise generated by air traffic. Aéroports de Montréal (www.admtl.com) offers not only a free newsletter you can subscribe to but also a set of useful tools for residents who would like to file a complaint about the sound environment. In addition to online complaint forms on the ADM website, you'll find an invitation to use the free WebTrak app. Complaints can also be submitted by telephone at 514 633-3351. Be sure to specify the date and time of the incident you're complaining about. Aéroports de Montréal follows up on the complaints they receive, all of which are entered in a log.

POSTPONEMENT OF THE LAUNCH OF THE REM

Following the recent announcement by REM to postpone the introduction of light rail service until 2024, the Town immediately made a request to the ARTM for bus service to be reinstated to the metro stations.

It should be noted that this delay in the schedule for the work on the Mount Royal Tunnel will have no effect on the construction site in our downtown area. In fact, the latter will be demobilized in the fall. Only partial hindrances, related in particular to the work to be completed inside the new train station, are to be expected. The configuration of the traffic lanes pedestrian and cyclist crossings on both bridges should return to normal in the coming weeks.

The future Station Square, nestled on the Dalle park slab will finally be developed next year.



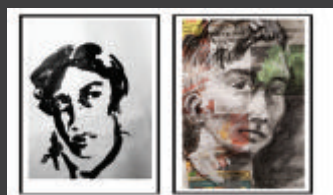

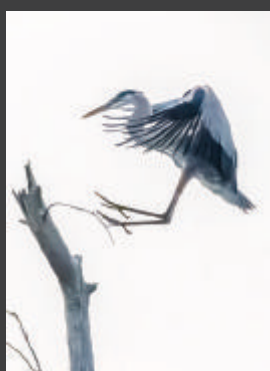
THE MUCH-ANTICIPATED RETURN OF THE ARTTRAM SHOW

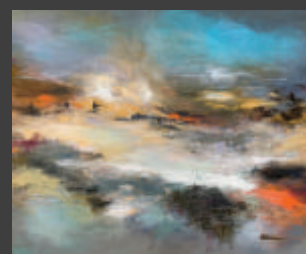
