WARNING SIREN TEST

The warning sirens are meant to warn people who are outdoors to quickly find shelter if a toxic substance is released. In the event of a toxic release, go into the nearest building, close the doors and windows, and turn off the ventilation system.

Message from the Mayor

A LOOK BACK AT THE SUMMER AND AN UPDATE ON THE NEW COMMUNITY SPORTS CENTRE

The summer we've just had brought us a few climatic surprises, including days with poor air quality and torrential rains, causing water damage to homes of a few Townies. On that topic, I'd like to mention that the Town had already commissioned a specialized firm to study the hydraulic capacity of its sewer systems in 2022. Once the firm has submitted its report, an action plan will be drawn up in collaboration with the Town's Technical Services. Additionally, for a fuller picture, we'll work with the agglomeration of Montreal to better understand the hydraulic performance of its collector system, which the Town of Mount Royal wastewater discharges into.

As for our resident homeowners, we mailed a letter providing some helpful recommendations for preventive measures to implement to avoid water damage in their basements. For more information, visit the Town's website at www.town.mount-royal.qc.ca.

On a more positive and encouraging note, I'd like to update you on the construction progress of the long-awaited Sports and Community Centre and its indoor pool.

My colleagues on the municipal council and I are very proud to announce that we've completed one more step in August. We awarded a contract to a multidisciplinary firm to conduct a Functional and Technical Plan (PFT), which includes support for call for tenders phases enabling a design-build construction.

What are the main benefits of design-build?

Several municipalities experimented with the design-build method before us and strongly recommended it. They mentioned that one of its benefits is its excellent predictability on costs and scheduling. This method provides many other

benefits, including that the entire project will be awarded to the same bidder, who will be responsible for the plans, specifications and construction.

I want to remind you that the new sports and community centre we chose features the same facilities as the previous version. It also preserves as many green spaces as possible in Danyluk Park. In addition to the indoor pool, the new centre will have a gym, multipurpose rooms and training rooms, art studios and spaces for our community groups. It will be a wonderful place to work out, learn and gather.

Another benefit to mention is that this project will help the Town maintain its resident services and continue most of the planned activities during construction.

In closing, I'm ecstatic about the steps we're taking to build this flagship project for our community. It will meet Townies current and future needs. Visit the Town's website to stay up to date on the progress of the sports and community centre project.

ELECTED OFFICIALS' COMMITTEE FOR SAFE MOBILITY

Safety for pedestrians, cyclists, and electric scooter users of all ages is a continued concern for all Townies.

That is why we set up an ad hoc committee to solve the problem of sharing the road equitably among all users. One of our objectives is to evaluate and propose different traffic calming measures to control speed and reduce traffic in general, making our residential streets safer.

Firstly, the new Station Square will allow pedestrians and cyclists to cross Town securely, with new sidewalks and protected bike lanes.

Other measures, such as raised intersections, are planned for some intersections. The raised intersections slope upward and offer a visual warning of a high-risk area ahead, prompting motorists to slow down and comply with the mandatory stop.

Lastly, an island like the one near Thibodeau Park will be created on Saint-Clare Road north of Kindersley Park. In addition to slowing traffic, the narrower road will facilitate park access.

Over the years, several notable actions have met with success, including:

- curb extensions to make roads narrower;
- barring access to streets adjacent to school zones;
- permanent and temporary speed displays;
- reducing the speed limit to 40 km/h on Lucerne Road;
- pedestrian islands and signals;
- rearranging the lanes around Dakin Park.

Regarding safety near schools, the Town recently engaged a traffic engineering firm to study potential traffic calming measures. The Town will be better equipped to evaluate next steps when the firm submits their report.

While the Ministère des Transports has banned the installation of speed bumps at mandatory stops, the Town is continuing to install permanent, elongated speed bumps. These will be installed in places where speeding has been observed to be a problem. You can see a complete map of speed bumps on our website.

We learned precisely which measures could be implemented through discussions with the administration. Many of the solutions adopted by other municipalities cannot be used in our Town, due to the narrowness, geometry, and other particularities of our residential streets.

Before we conclude, it should be noted that police records reveal that most local traffic tickets are issued to residents of our garden city. That means making our Town safer begins at home, with our own conduct.

In closing, our committee continues to collaborate and work with the Town's administration. Together we hope to find innovative safe mobility solutions to protect our residents. We still have a long way to go, and we trust we can rely on all Townies' cooperation!



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DEALING WITH EXTREME WEATHER

On April 5, Quebec faced an unexpected and exceptional situation: an ice storm, which was twice as bad as the weather predictions. As a result, several homes in Mount Royal experienced power outages. More recently, in recent weeks, heavy and sudden rains caused water damage to basements in many homes either through backflows or surface water build-ups.

Fortunately, during the ice storm, the Town quickly responded to the magnitude of the weather event by opening a coffee and warm up space at town hall. It helped nearly 700 residents. Meanwhile, our Public Works and Public Security employees were mobilizing out in the field to ensure streets were safe and that emergency vehicles could travel freely. The Town quickly picked up, pruned and shredded branches and felled dangerous trees.

As for water damage in some basements, the Town is aware of the situation. Although the network is just over 100 years old in some neighbourhoods, Mount Royal places great importance on the condition of its underground infrastructure. The Town regularly maintains and cleans it, and replaces sections when required.

The municipality awarded a contract worth nearly \$80,000 to a specialized consulting engineering firm to run a study on the hydraulic capacity of the municipality's sewage systems, which flow into the Urban Agglomeration of Montreal's main sewers. Town Technical Services staff are working closely with the consultant to finish the report, which will help us come up with a game plan. For its part, the Urban Agglomeration of Montreal will eventually have to share the hydraulic capacity of its network in which the water from Mount Royal flows.

The current study conducted by the consulting engineering firm will also examine the ability of the streets to retain a significant amount of water and serve as a retention basin.

In some cases this can slow water flowing into the system and prevent it from further overloading.

For their part, property owners can implement many preventive best practices the risks of their basement flooding. They can install working check valves* on every plumbing connections, ensure that their land has a slight slope so surface water flows towards the street. They also ensure their drains and gutters work properly and that foundations have no cracks in them. Owners must also check that their gutters aren't connected to their French drain so that the water flows unto their land. Landscaping with many green areas and water-absorbing plants will also help reduce the water flowing into the Town's sewers.

In closing, although we wanted prevent damage from heavy rains (or any other damage that could implicate the Town), I'd like to remind you that anyone wishing to make a claim must provide written notice to the Town within 15 days of an incident. Information relevant to claims is available on the Town's website at www.town.mount-royal.qc.ca

*For check valves, it's important to be careful during heavy rainfalls. If the valves are already closed to prevent backflow, they will also prevent any other water from flowing out of the house, creating another flood risk.

STATION SQUARE LAYOUT

Mount Royal has been developing Station Square since the beginning of July. The new space will be located a stone's throw from the historic CN railway station, which is now home to Pizzaiolle restaurant and near the new REM station, Ville-de-Mont-Royal.

This new public space will at last connect the western and eastern sides of the Garden City and will include a landscaped green space, pedestrian paths, a bike path, shade houses and other outdoor structures.

Station Square is set to open in spring 2024.

72 HOUR EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS KIT!

In a serious emergency, you'll need some basic supplies so you can be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours. You may have to get by without electricity or running water. The ice storm that hit Quebec on April 5, 2023, was twice as big as forecasted, proving that a situation of this magnitude can happen at any time. It is very important to be aware of the risks we may face.

A basic emergency kit should include the following items:

- Water - Two litres of water per person per day
- Food - Non-perishable foods such as canned goods, energy bars and dehydrated foods
- Manual can opener
- Hand-crank or battery-powered flashlight
- Hand-crank or battery-powered radio
- Spare batteries
- First-aid kit
- Extra keys (for car and house)
- Cash
- Emergency plan

SPEED HUMPS AND SAFETY ON RESIDENTIAL STREETS

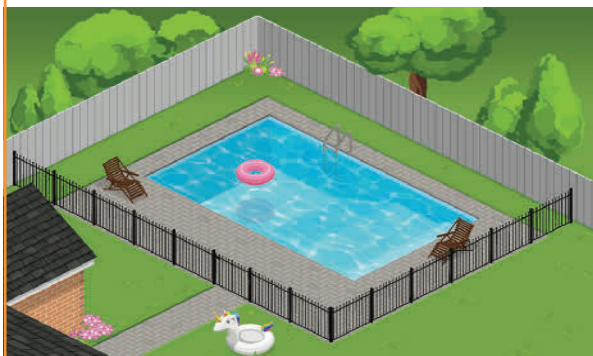
The Town regularly receives requests for speed humps from citizens concerned about speeding. The Town revised its policy on the installation of speed humps on residential streets in 2015. This policy is available on the website at www.town.mount-royal.qc.ca.

The main benefit of speed humps is that they help reduce average traffic speeds.

Speed humps can be installed in the immediate vicinity of 30 km/h zones where speeding is a concern, on the advice of the Director of Technical Services.

Please note that lanes with a set speed limit of 50 km/h with bus routes, identified fire lanes or designated as arterial roads are not eligible for speed humps. Please consult the complete map of existing and planned speed humps on our website.

NEW RESIDENTIAL POOL REGULATIONS AND SELF-EVALUATION FORM



The Town of Mount Royal has sent a self-evaluation form to all pool owners affected by the new Residential Swimming Pool Safety Regulation, which requires installation of an enclosure around the pool to control access and make the pool safe.

This questionnaire will help owners determine whether their pool or hot tub (2,000 litres or more) complies with the new regulations. Although the deadline for bringing your pool or hot tub into compliance with the regulation is **September 30, 2025**, we strongly suggest that you complete your self-evaluation form and submit it to the Urban Planning and Development Division by **September 30, 2023**, as a permit may be required to comply with certain requirements of the regulation.

NEW PLAYGROUND AT GUNDY PARK



The Town inaugurated a new, innovative, and expanded playground in Gundy Park at the beginning of the summer. Inspired by nature and the forest, the playground is made almost entirely out of natural wood logs and now welcomes Mount Royal's young explorers.

This new, inclusive playground was built in line with sustainable development values and includes play areas for different age groups, one for children aged 0-5 years old and another for kids aged 5-12. The playground includes a carousel for nine children that can alternately accommodate two children in wheelchairs, different types of swings, slides, a shock-absorbing surface, and an area covered in wood chips. Playground equipment choices were made with the help and collaboration of Ms. Annie Tremblay

from the Association de parents de Mont-Royal (APMR).

The new playground helps diversify playground offerings, as per the Town's goal, allowing children to let their imaginations run wild against the backdrop of a nature-inspired play area. Our playground offers fun challenges for all children, including children with disabilities. The playground is designed to help children develop their psychomotor skills and encourage creativity.

PREMIUM QUALITY WATER

Are you concerned about lead in your drinking water? Are you curious about your water quality in general?

In Mount Royal, weekly tests are carried out within the local network, providing an opportunity for continuous monitoring of drinking water quality, particularly in terms of chlorine. Once a year, a more in-depth analysis is done to test for lead and copper. This in-depth testing validates the lead content and quality of the water in Mount Royal, even though the results have never indicated a problem. Residents who would like to have their drinking water service line checked should contact a plumber. Residents who would like to have their water quality tested should contact a private laboratory.

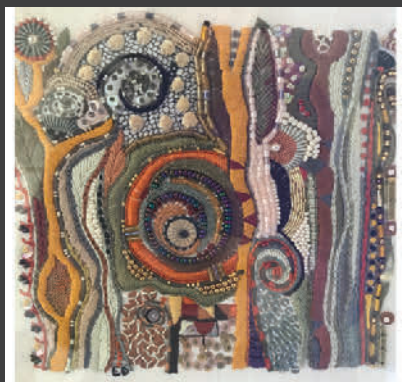

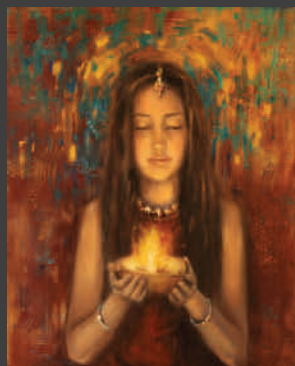
The Station Square site, tucked into the Dalle Park, will finally be inaugurated in the spring of 2024.

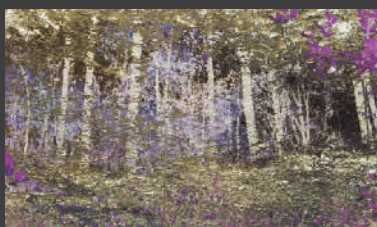

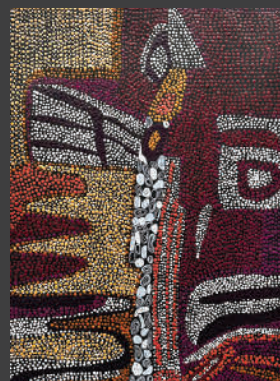
