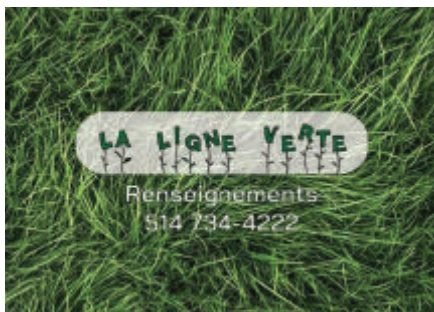

OPENING AND REDESIGN OF THE GRAHAM WEST BOULEVARD BIKE LANE

This summer, the Town of Mount Royal will adjust the layout of the bike lane on Graham Boulevard, between Kindersley and Glengarry Avenues. The bike lane will be relocated between the traffic lane and the parking lane, while vehicle parking will now take place along the curb. The bike lane will open once the road markings and signage have been completed, weather permitting.

COMMUNITY AND SPORTS CENTRE (CSC): CONSTRUCTION REACHES A NEW MILESTONE

Construction of the future Community and Sports Centre (CSC) is progressing rapidly, and several major milestones have been reached in recent weeks. As of the end of April, the project had reached nearly **30% overall completion**.

Excavation and foundation work are now very advanced, and nearly complete. Meanwhile, approximately **80%** of the building's structure has been erected. The remaining work mainly concerns the walls and roof of the pool section, for which the concrete forms have just been poured on site. Interior construction work has also begun, while installation of the building's exterior envelope is now underway.

Overall, the project remains on schedule. Over the coming weeks, crews will continue backfilling the foundations, complete the structural work, and gradually begin roofing and curtain wall installation. The goal remains to fully enclose the building by the end of August, allowing interior work to move forward throughout the fall and winter.

30-40 ROOSEVELT: CONSTRUCTION IS PROGRESSING STEADILY

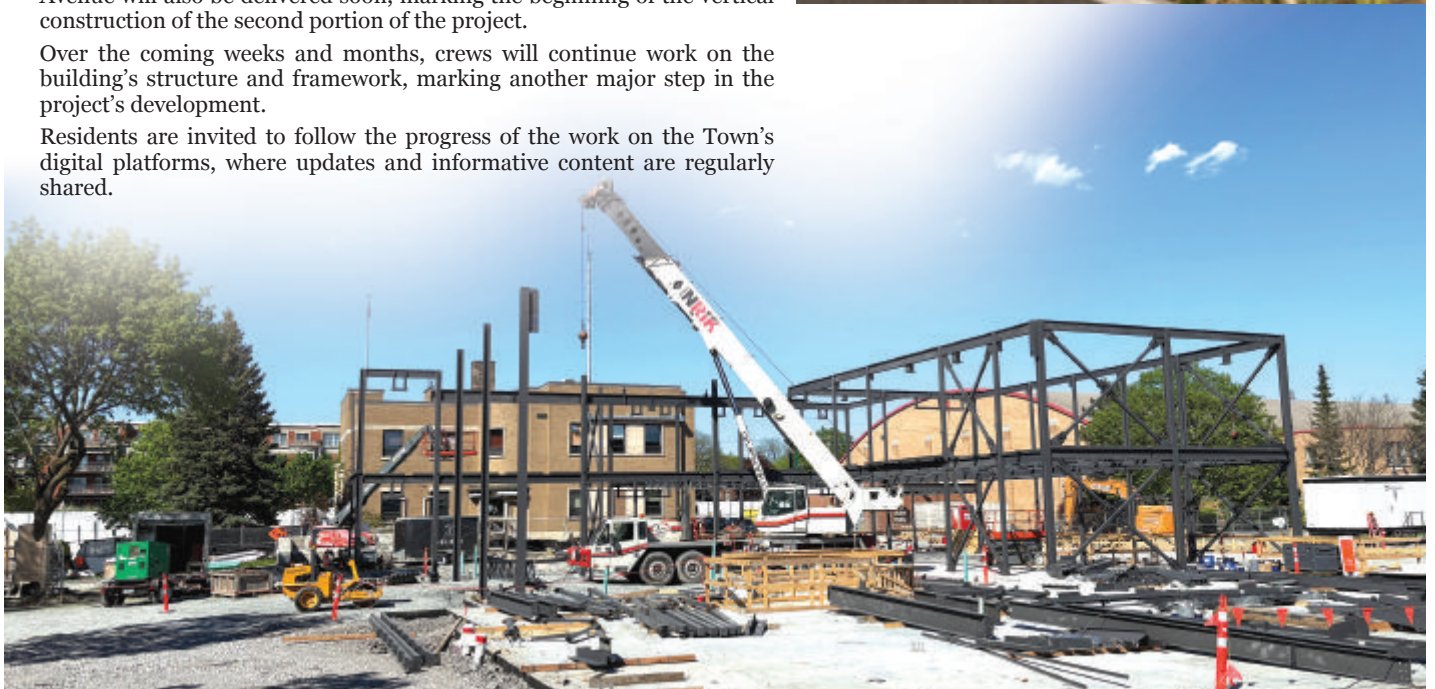
Construction of the future municipal building located at 30-40 Roosevelt Avenue continues to move forward steadily, with several important milestones recently completed on site.

Concrete work is progressing well, including the pouring of the foundation walls and the ground-floor structural slab. Waterworks were also carried out over the past few weeks, including the ongoing installation of stormwater retention basins, an important component of the site's rainwater management system.

The project is now reaching another important milestone as the building begins to rise above ground. The assembly of the steel structure for the future fire station at 30, Roosevelt Avenue is currently underway and is expected to be completed shortly. The wood structure for 40, Roosevelt Avenue will also be delivered soon, marking the beginning of the vertical construction of the second portion of the project.

Over the coming weeks and months, crews will continue work on the building's structure and framework, marking another major step in the project's development.

A COMMUNITY-BUILDING SUMMER PROGRAM IN THE TOWN OF MOUNT ROYAL

Your new multi-purpose citizen portal!

The Town of Mount Royal's communications team would like to inform you of an important change to its direct communication service with residents, both for emergency alerts and calls as well as for regular notifications.

Until recently, the Town has used **CodeRED** for emergency alerts and calls, and the **Beiti+** system for SMS and email notifications related to regular communications. These two platforms operated separately and meant two separate accounts for residents.

As of now, all alerts will be consolidated and distributed through govillemo.ca, a new portal offered by our website provider. This change will allow for better coordination of emergency communications and regular notifications using a single platform.

Would you like to be notified of emergencies, activities, and the latest news from TMR? Would you like to always have the collection schedule at your fingertips? Please take a few minutes to register on the new **govillemo.ca** portal to create your profile and select the notifications you would like to receive. It will soon also be possible to access your citizen portal by downloading the free **govillemo** app from the Apple Store and Google Play.

72-HOUR KIT: BE READY IN CASE OF AN EMERGENCY!

In a serious emergency situation, you'll need some basic supplies so you can be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours. You may have to get by without electricity or running water. In a serious situation like this, it is wise to have an emergency kit on hand.

A basic emergency kit includes the following items:

Water – Two liters of water per person per day

Food – Non-perishable foods such as canned goods, energy bars and dehydrated foods

Hand-held can opener – Hand-cranked or battery-powered flashlight and radio – Spare

batteries First – aid kit and special-needs items – Extra keys for car and home

Cash – Emergency plan

MAJOR ROAD RESURFACING WORK IS PLANNED FOR THIS FALL

An additional budget of approximately \$4 million was recently approved by the Town council to fund road resurfacing work. A call for bids will be issued toward the end of the summer, and work is expected to begin this fall.

The targeted areas are as follows:

- Côte-de-Liesse Road (certain sections between Lucerne Road and Rockland Road)
- Rockland Road (several sections between Graham Blvd. and Côte-de-Liesse Road)
- Streets surrounding Connaught Park

Further details will be posted on the Town’s website once work begins.

RESILIENT PROPERTIES

Registration is in full swing, and inspections by JFSA Québec Inc. began a few weeks ago.

Haven’t registered yet, but your property qualifies? The process is simple: please fill out the form in the **Resilient Properties** section of the website, provide your information, and submit your registration request.

RAINWATER RETENTION PARK PROJECT

We are currently inviting tenders to determine the fees for the Town’s rainwater retention park project. Once the contract is awarded, the selected firm will assess the proposed sites to identify the locations best suited for developing a rainwater retention park.

A rainwater retention park is a green space designed to naturally absorb, retain, and filter rainwater. Built below street level, it captures urban surface runoff during heavy downpours to help prevent flooding and relieve pressure on the sewer system.

WATERING: EVERY DROP COUNTS THIS SUMMER IN TMR

Due to major work on the Montréal agglomeration’s water distribution system, the water supply in TMR will be limited this summer. More than ever, compliance with watering restrictions is essential. By spreading out water demand, the Town reduces consumption peaks and ensures sufficient reserves are maintained for emergencies such as fires.

WATERING: COMPLY WITH THE BY-LAW, AVOID FINES

Due to a limited water supply this summer, residents are reminded to comply with the watering by-law in Town of Mount Royal. Please refer to the schedule below to avoid fines issued by Public Security.

RESIDUAL WASTE COLLECTION: A REMINDER OF KEY GUIDELINES FOR 7 UNIT OR LESS

Household waste, recyclables, and organic waste: The Town of Mount Royal offers several collection services to effectively manage residual waste. To ensure efficient service, it is important to follow the current guidelines.

Collection takes place primarily on Wednesdays for buildings with 7 units or fewer, beginning at 7:00. Bins must be placed out after 19:00 the previous day or before 7:00 on the day of collection and then brought back inside before 23:00.

With the mechanization of recycling collection (blue bin), certain rules are particularly important: bins must be placed in the driveway (not on the sidewalk), 15 to 30 cm from the curb, facing the street, and spaced at least 30 cm apart. The bins must be accessible, with their lids completely closed, and no objects or vehicles must obstruct the mechanical arm. No bags or materials should be placed next to the bins.

Bins that are improperly positioned or non-compliant will not be collected. It is also important to note that there is no second collection for recycling if you forget to put out your bins.

The Town wishes to remind residents of the importance of following these guidelines to avoid missed collections and to contribute to responsible waste management.

RESIDENTIAL POOL SAFETY: DEADLINE EXTENDED TO 2027

Residential pools pose a significant drowning risk, particularly for young children. That is why the provincial Residential Pool Safety Regulation imposes strict standards. We remind you that all outdoor pools must be properly secured. In most cases, this involves installing a compliant enclosure around the pool to restrict access. This enclosure must be at least 1.2 m high, prevent the passage of an object 10 cm in diameter, and be designed so that it cannot be climbed over. To allow residents to comply with the requirements, the deadline has been extended to **September 30, 2027**. This additional time is intended to give homeowners the necessary time to complete the required work. The Town wishes to reiterate the importance of complying with current regulations.

PUBLIC PARKING: REMINDER OF THE 24-HOUR LIMIT

The Town of Mount Royal reminds users that outdoor parking adjacent to Town Hall is limited to a maximum of 24 consecutive hours.

It is therefore prohibited to leave a vehicle there beyond this period. To avoid receiving a ticket, drivers must remove their vehicle from the parking lot for a period of at least 24 hours before returning.

It is also recommended that, upon returning, you do not park in the same spot to avoid any confusion during inspections by parking enforcement officers.

Please note that the Wicksteed public parking lot is also subject to this measure.

BIXI IS ROLLING AHEAD IN TMR

The BIXI season officially began on April 7. In Town of Mount Royal, the stations are in the same spots as last year and are ready to welcome users.

Thanks to this service, residents can enjoy a convenient and eco-friendly mode of transportation for their trips throughout Greater Montreal.

To make your trips easier, we recommend using BIXI's online tools to check bike availability, plan your routes, and locate nearby stations.

The Town invites you to take full advantage of this service during the warm season.



NEW FLOWER PLANTERS: MEASURES TO LIMIT THROUGH TRAFFIC

To reduce through traffic on small residential streets in the western part of the Garden City, the Town of Mount Royal is continuing to install flower planters.

A pilot project launched in 2024 led to the installation of these flower planters on Graham and Laird Boulevards. Following feedback received and an analysis conducted by a specialized firm, new locations have been confirmed, notably at the Mitchell/Hanover and Caledonia intersections, and near Dunvegan/Winton.

These measures aim to limit through traffic and improve safety and quality of life for residents. The addition of signage and speed bumps supports this initiative.

The flower planters were installed in late May 2026. Observations will be conducted throughout the season to evaluate their effectiveness. The flower planters will be removed in the fall, and the results will guide decisions regarding the next steps of the project.

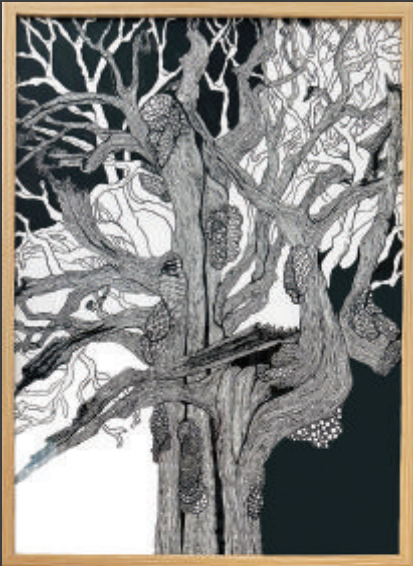

This was the case when work on a runway at YUL Montréal-Trudeau International Airport changed the paths and frequency of flights over our Garden City.

Filing a complaint online or by phone

As noise nuisances related to airports are under the federal government's jurisdiction and not the nearby municipalities, it falls to Transport Canada to enforce compliance with air traffic noise regulations. Aéroports de Montréal (www.admtl.com) offers a free newsletter as well as a set of useful tools for residents who would like to file a noise complaint. You'll also find an invitation to use the free WebTrak app. Complaints can also be filed by telephone at 514 633-3351. Aéroports de Montréal will follow up, and all the complaints they receive are entered in a log.
